

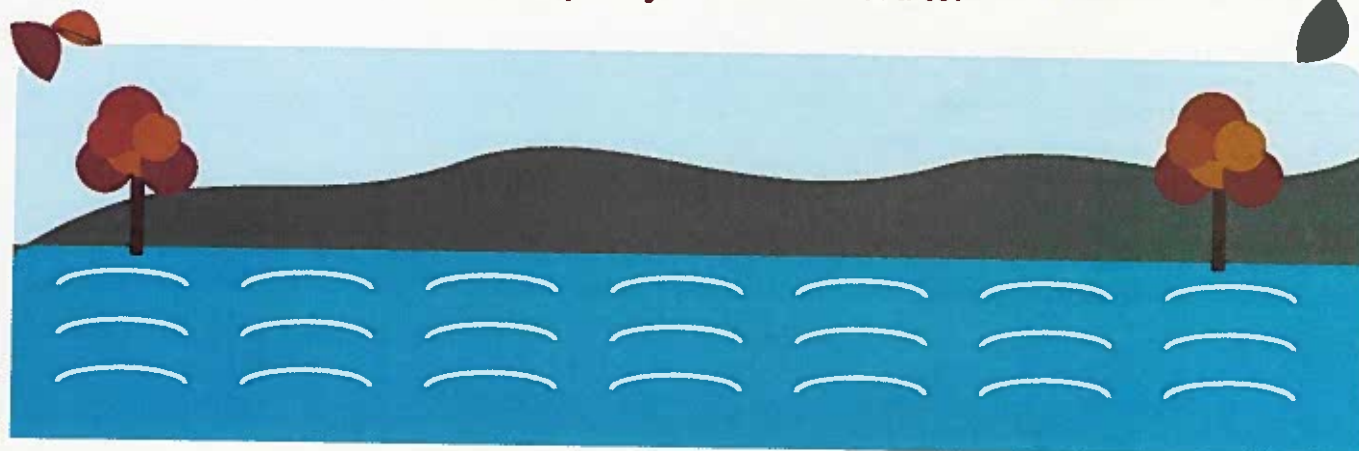

We had a well-attended Rollout Meeting on August 11, where the Proposed Bylaws and other pertinent information were distributed. The goal now is for members to review the Proposed Bylaws and share any issues, questions, or concerns with the Board. This is done using the Member Response Sheet (also known as the Feedback Form) included in the packet.

On the form, members should:

- Provide their unit number.
- Write any concerns or questions under the appropriate heading.
- Submit the completed form by **August 31** in the collection box located on the credenza in the Great Room.

Members also received these documents electronically. If you prefer to submit your feedback electronically, please contact me at litherlm@gvsu.edu for instructions.

Below is the schedule for the remainder of the process. Please pay particular attention to the **September 8** and **September 14** membership gatherings (and their corresponding times). During these sessions, the Board will address concerns submitted through the Member Response Sheets and provide opportunities for discussion.

For many of us September always brings memories of going back to school after the long, lazy days of Summer. New notebooks, sharpened pencils, new classmates, maybe new shoes and of course, new teachers.

Our Great Room decorations in September salute the 20+ Members who served in our schools and colleges in “their other lives” before coming to Michigan Shores.

Some of those teachers made lasting impressions, all of them molded us in some way. Following are some reminiscences about teachers who made an impact.

Mrs. Zimmerman, my kindergarten teacher from 63 years ago. In my imagination she resembles the fairy godmother in Cinderella. After nap time on our mats, she would “waken” us with a magic wand while playing the “Dance of the Sugar Plum Fairy” from the Nutcracker. She had a circus for parent-teacher conference where we each planned an act or played an animal. She was warm and kind and balm to the soul of a little girl whose parents had just divorced. One of my favorite teachers was **my third-grade teacher**. She liked birds. We colored many, many different birds. I think my love of birds started there. (From Jan Faulkner)

I will choose **Miss Elwood**, my third-grade teacher. She read to us every day and sparked my love of reading and of the physical books. **The Boxcar Children** was my favorite. To this day I treasure the physical books that I have loved. (From Mary Scholl)

My favorite teachers are **my parents, Bob and Pat Lekovish** (former long time Michigan Shores members). My mom was never employed but she was a “life coach” to many. My dad was a history teacher and guidance counselor in Farmington. He also coached. They were never not working or doing something in our community and my abiding memory of my younger years is of my parents being constantly greeted and chatted up wherever we went. Amy Jones, Principal, recognized what we had at Platte River Elementary and she let us blossom! She always had our back. She took classes with us when an MSU professor came to sharpen our teaching skills. She saw us as teachers, not technicians, and took off the reins. We guided each other, our kids improved and parents enjoyed being part of it all. Amy encouraged us to go beyond ourselves and boy did we. A teacher of teachers, Amy created an environment where it wasn't just the kids that grew. (From Dodie Bedell)

Mr. Biggs was my 10th grade biology teacher who stimulated my interest in outdoor conservation. He introduced a unique field biology class that taught everything from soil conservation to rifle shooting. It's the only class I got an A in because he made it so interesting. (From Lee Muehlmann)

Stan Turrentine—my high school band director, not the jazz legend—is the teacher I remember most and not just because I had him for 5 years and spent endless hours at band practice. Mr. T was a taskmaster in the best sense, pulling the best from each of us mercurial teens to mold an ensemble that worked together seamlessly. The music we made was beautiful, but the best reward was being a part of the whole that created it. What a gift his teaching was! (From Sarah Thompson)

The Benefits of Cooperative Living

As a community we are diverse, independent, intelligent, socially and politically conscious. Most Michigan Shores members actively volunteer within the region taking care of the environment, helping at food pantries, doing outreach at local libraries, or working part-time while remaining active with friends and family.

Members respect one another's privacy while supporting each other as a community of neighbors. With many choices to spend private time in your apartment or get involved in member activities, Cooperative living affords the best of both worlds for social and emotional engagement.

The Cooperative is governed by its members, who elect a Board of Directors annually. Members, through their Board of Directors and Committees, make policy decisions and plan events. Examples of planned activities include concerts, exercise groups, educational

speakers, card games, movie nights, travel logs, special entertainment, monthly dinners and breakfasts.

Buying a membership in the Cooperative offers all of the tax benefits of home ownership, without the responsibilities of maintenance and upkeep. Membership apartments are available through an initial "share" purchase, plus a monthly carrying fee. Should a member need to move, Cooperative memberships can be re-sold to an incoming new member.

As a non-profit Corporation, the Board and its members are invested in keeping operating costs low so that carrying fees remain affordable. Each member's monthly carrying fee includes heat, water, sewer, cable TV, wireless internet; refuse removal, recycling, maintenance as well as a secure entrance, enclosed garage and additional storage. The purchase of any retirement home, cottage or condominium requires a much greater investment than the purchase of a share in the Cooperative. In addition, with traditional apartments monthly rent generally pays for lodging and no utilities or services are included, making the cost of

living in an apartment far greater than in a Cooperative.

Members at Michigan Shores come from many walks of life, experience levels, educational backgrounds and social circles. As a group, you'll find this "neighborhood" to be comprised of active, intelligent, socially conscious and well-traveled adults. We are compassionate, inviting, unassuming and involved in our membership and local community. We look for ways to contribute to one another while respecting each other's privacy. Offering activities throughout the month, there is always something to do with friends at Michigan Shores.

The Michigan Shores Cooperative began in 1987 by Telfer Mook, after seeing a need for affordable, independent senior housing in Benzie County. With the help of Munson Health Care and the Community Retirement Housing Association Inc. of Frankfort MI as partners, work began.

Since 1991, the Cooperative, located on a 19-acre ridge overlooking Lake Michigan, has provided independent housing for active seniors ages 55 and

older. Michigan Shores has 54 stand-alone apartments, with both 1- and 2-bedroom styles available. Apartments are completely open to customization and residents may decorate and remodel creating the home of their dreams.

IMPORTANT POSTAL MAIL NOTICE

Please help us ensure that mail in our community is handled correctly and efficiently.

If you receive a piece of mail in your box that is **not addressed to you**, our U.S. Postal Service mail carrier asks that you immediately place it in the **"Misdirected Mail" slot located in the entry lobby.**

Why this matters:

When you place misdirected mail into this specific slot, the post office officially logs it as an incorrect mailing address. This helps the postal service update their sorting systems, redirect the mail properly, and prevent the same delivery errors from happening in the future.

We know that many of our residents are just trying to be helpful by personally passing mail along to neighbors or trying to find the rightful owner themselves. While we appreciate this neighborly spirit, bypassing the postal system means the underlying

addressing error never gets fixed.

To ensure the long-term accuracy of our mail delivery, please do not distribute misdirected mail yourself. Drop it directly into the lobby's misdirected mail slot so the post office can handle it correctly.

Everyone talks about VENMO, what is it and how to do I set it up on my mobile phone.

Venmo is a free digital phone app that lets you safely send and receive money with family and friends without using cash or paper checks. It links to your bank account, debit card, or credit card so you can easily pay someone back or accept money from them.

How to Download the App

- **Open the app store:** On an iPhone, tap the **App Store** icon. On an Android phone, tap the **Google Play Store** icon.
- **Search for Venmo:** Tap the search icon (magnifying glass), type **Venmo**, and press search.
- **Install the app:** Tap the button that says **Get** or **Install** next to the official [Venmo](#) app.
- **Wait for it to finish:** The app will download and place a blue Venmo icon on your phone screen.
- **How to Create an Account**
- **Open Venmo:** Tap the blue Venmo icon on your phone.
- **Tap Sign Up:** Choose the **Personal** account option.
- **Enter your phone number:** Type your cell phone number and tap next.
- **Verify your number:** Venmo will text a code to your phone. Type that code into the app to prove it is your phone.
- **Add your details:** Type in your first and last name, your email address, and create a secure password.
- **Link a bank or card:** Follow the prompts to safely connect a bank account or debit card so you have a way to fund your payments. See below....
- **Set privacy to Private:** When asked about sharing, choose **Private** so your payments are kept safe and hidden from strangers. Would you like help with **how to safely send your first payment** or **how to link your bank account** step-by-step?

FINAL STEPS TO COMPLETING YOUR VENMO SET UP.

1. Linking a Bank Account

[Venmo](#) uses a secure system called Plaid to instantly link your bank account using your online banking credentials.

- **Open Settings:** Tap the **Me** tab (profile icon) in the bottom right corner, then tap the **Settings** gear icon in the top right.
- **Select Payment Methods:** Tap **Payment Methods**, then tap **Add bank or card**.
- **Choose Bank:** Select **Bank** from the options.
- **Select Verification Method:** Choose **Instant Verification** (recommended for immediate use).

- **Log In:** Follow the secure prompts to select your bank and enter your **online banking username and password**.
- **Alternative Option:** If your bank isn't listed, choose **Manual Verification** instead. You will need to enter your bank's **routing number and account number**. Venmo will send two micro-deposits within 3 business days to verify the account.

Once you have linked your bank information to your venmo account, you are ready to start receiving and sending payments through your venmo app on our phone.

2. Sending Payments

Once the bank is successfully linked, sending a payment takes only a few taps.

- **Start Payment:** Tap the **Pay or Request** button (often looks like a pencil and notepad or a "Pay/Request" shortcut) at the bottom center of the screen.
- **Find the Recipient:** Type the recipient's **name, @username, email, or phone number** into the search bar.
- **Confirm Identity:** Ensure you select the correct person by verifying their profile picture. (You can also tap the **QR code icon** next to the search bar to scan their phone screen directly if they are next to you).
- **Enter Amount:** Type in the **dollar amount** you want to send.
- **Add a Note:** Write a mandatory **note or description** (e.g., "Dinner" or "Rent") or add an emoji.
- **Review Funding Source:** Tap the payment method listed at the bottom to ensure it is set to your **linked bank account** (not a credit card, which incurs fees).
- **Send:** Tap the green **Pay** button to send the money instantly.

3. Receiving Payments & Transferring to a Bank

When someone sends your friend money, it stays in their Venmo balance until they manually move it to their bank.

- **Check Balance:** View the incoming funds instantly in the **Me** tab under the Venmo Balance section.
- **Initiate Transfer:** Tap the **Manage** or **Transfer** button next to the balance.
- **Enter Amount:** Type the specific **amount** you wish to move to the bank account.
- **Choose Transfer Speed:**
 - **Instant Transfer:** Moves money in minutes for a **1.75% fee** (minimum \$0.25, maximum \$25). Select your linked debit card for this option.
 - **1-3 Business Days:** Completely **free**. Select your linked bank account for this option.
- **Confirm:** Tap the green **Transfer** button to finalize the transaction.

NORTHERN MICHIGAN UNSOLVED: WHO KILLED 15-YEAR-OLD TERRY SUTTER?

More than half a century has passed, but one of Benzie County's most haunting mysteries remains unsolved.

Terry Wayne Sutter was only 15 years old.

On the evening of September 1, 1973, Terry was in Frankfort and planned to spend time with friends. When he failed to return home, his family became worried and began searching for him.

The following day, September 2, a visitor walking along the Lake Michigan shoreline near Frankfort spotted what initially appeared to be someone lying on the beach.

It was Terry.

Early speculation suggested the teenager may have drowned, but the investigation soon took a disturbing turn. According to historical reporting citing the pathology findings, Terry had no water in his lungs. Instead, his cause of death was described as massive sand inhalation.

There were also indications that Terry had been assaulted.

Over the years, witnesses reportedly came forward with information about suspicious activity from the night Terry disappeared. Investigators also found beer cans and cigarette butts near the bluff where Terry was believed to have been before his death.

Even Terry's clothing raised questions. His pants were reportedly discovered days later on the Frankfort pier, away from where his body had been found.

The case has been revisited several times over the decades, including major investigative efforts years after Terry's death.

Still, no one has ever been charged with killing Terry Sutter.

More than 50 years later, Terry's family continues to hope that someone who knows what happened will finally come forward.

Someone may have carried this secret for decades.

Someone may have heard a confession.

Someone may know a detail they never realized was important.

Terry was 15 years old. He deserves answers, and his family deserves to know what happened.

If you lived in the Frankfort or Benzie County area in 1973 and remember anything surrounding Terry's death, even something that seemed insignificant at the time, consider contacting law enforcement.

A share belongs to a member until the member or his/her estate offers to sell. The value at the time of the sale is based on the original cost, plus 1% of the value of the unit (established at the initial endorsement of the project mortgage) for each year of occupancy. The 1% limited-equity formula is under direct control of the Cooperative. The Share Cost is increased by the 1% limited equity every September 19th.

Capital Fee Policy Adopted September 19, 2017 Amended 04/21/2026

The Michigan Shores Cooperative shall assess a capital fee based on membership sales value for new members to fund building repairs, replacements, and the capital improvement fund.

All membership purchases will be assessed a 20% capital fee added to the member share cost,

and is calculated on the stated member share cost or sold member share cost, whichever is greater

Any current member who have previously paid a capital fee will be credited that amount towards the new membership purchase.

Members moving to a smaller unit do not get the difference refunded to them.

CYCLOSPORIASIS

What You Need to Know 2026 Outbreak



What is it?

Cyclosporiasis is an illness caused by a parasite. The parasite can make you sick. It affects the stomach and intestines.

Symptoms:

Explosive and frequent diarrhea.

Loss of appetite.

Stomach pain.

Nausea.

Feeling tired.

Weight loss.

Symptoms may last for several weeks if not treated.

How does it spread?

You can get sick by eating contaminated fresh fruits or vegetables. Cyclosporiasis is not typically spread from person to person.

Foods linked to past outbreaks:

- Leafy greens, such as lettuce.
- Fresh fruits, such as raspberries.
- Fresh vegetables, such as snow peas and green onions.
- Fresh herbs, such as cilantro and basil.

Prevention



Wash, peel and/or cook fresh produce.

- Discard any damaged areas.
- Cook greens (sauté, steam, stir-fry) to a temperature of at least 158°F (70°C).



Buy whole heads of lettuce and remove the outer layers.

- Choose whole heads over pre-cut bagged salad mixes when possible.
- Discard the outer 2-3 layers of leaves.



Store fresh produce separated from ready-to-eat foods.

- Keep lettuce and salad greens in sealed bags or containers.



Prevent potential contamination between fresh produce.

- Clean cutting boards, countertops and utensils after preparing salads.
- Wash any fruits or vegetables that may have come into contact with lettuce.



Follow food safety practices for all fresh produce.

- Wash your hands after handling produce.



Ask about food safety when eating outside of the home.

- Ask how the kitchen is handling produce, especially lettuce and salad greens.

Treatment

See a health care provider, take medicine as directed and drink plenty of fluids.
